4. Narrative Report

4a) Please provide an analysis on the strategies, activities, and timelines used throughout the outreach campaign.

Molly Snider attended Mendocino County Census Committee meetings monthly to stay informed about countywide efforts and provide reports to the committee regarding educational outreach. (September to April)

Participation in this forum was very helpful in developing the county office of education plan in that ideas were shared, connections were made with state and county organization partners. This was the greatest asset in bringing a collaborative and unified effort to census outreach from key roles.

Molly Snider attended CA Census Counts, Bi-Weekly Partners, and COE Census Partner meetings to stay informed about statewide efforts regarding educational outreach. (August to May)

Participation in these meetings was helpful in tapping into resources and ideas to strengthen local outreach, as well as understanding the changing needs/requirements of the statewide census work.

Molly Snider connected with census partners to align resources and strengthen capacity for local outreach. (Monthly)

Professional Development for Census provided at MCOE. (January 27, 2020)

Provided Count Me In! Census Curriculum Professional Development January 27, 2020 – presented by Frank Pisi of Sacramento County Office of Education.

Virtual census information and outreach sessions were offered but lacked registrations.

Developed Census Poster Contest (January – March) – a call to action and civic engagement for youth grades 6-12 in the county. Three prizes were awarded for 1st/2nd/3rd place with gift cards to local book and art stores.

Sent out a survey and introduction to resources (September) to engage school districts and encourage participate in the county office outreach activities.

Jo Godwin of the US Census Bureau collaborated with me to assemble a collection of resources that I would deliver to districts to use as census outreach at their local schools. Once the items were determined, she delivered them to the office. They were then assembled in relevant bundles and delivered via agency employees who would be visiting school sites.

4b) Please state what adjustments were made to conduct outreach during the shelter-in-place orders.

All outreach was conducted through emailed Census Updates, offers for support to districts, continued virtual attendance in statewide meetings, and Face Book social media posts.

4c) What activities, if any, do you have planned for June?

There are no other activities planned for June unless districts reach out for support, resources or materials. An offering is in place should anyone request support from the county office.

4d) What approach(s) worked well for outreach to students and their families that could inform subsequent Census outreach efforts in school districts? Why did it work well?

Professional Development Highlights for the Census: The most successful outreach was with personal contact at professional development sessions where information was provided with answers to questions, handouts. This type of outreach was like presenting mini elevator speeches with information that was relevant for the audience. Each time, members of the audience also received handouts, posters, or swag.

The Census Updates Newsletters that were developed at our agency were helpful in tailoring information for the county with resources and tools that could be accessed. They also created a frequent reminder to continue the outreach. The educational tools that were offered also supported instruction to highlight the census with students. The social media posts were frequent and kept the outreach for the census visible on a weekly basis.

Attendance at the local Mendocino Counts Committee meetings each month also created connections, alignment, and strengthened outreach from multiple organizations that have community impact.

4e) Did the activities reach other audiences? Do you have other insights to share about the approaches?

The activities reached other audiences when information was presented at local professional development sessions. The Face Book posts reached a broader community audience. It would have been helpful to have set up a table at student events throughout the county. This was planned for the county science fair but was halted due to COVID.

4f) Please list 3 to 5 recommendations for operations and processes for future Census outreach. Please state what could be improved and what worked well.

For future operations and processes:

- Outreach Toolkits (The various toolkits were very helpful in providing resources in varied media and languages)
- Media images, videos, scripts to use for outreach (The variety helped to build relevant outreach with context, audience, and language)
- Curriculum Statistics in Schools, Count Me In! Census Curriculum, Coloring Books (These resources were great for sharing with districts, promoting interdisciplinary learning to highlight the what, why, and how of the census)
- Student community service projects: tables at events; poster contest; public service announcements (these activities promote student voice and civic contribution and highlight the importance of the census)
- A team of supports for COEs US Bureau, State, County (these aspects were very helpful to our outreach)
- The local newsletters that were developed at the county level were useful. It
 would have been great to have a template created at the state level to modify
 at the county level.

5. Please provide additional comments below

The Census work was important and I am glad that the county office of education could be part of the initiative and outreach. It is a shared civic responsibility and as educational leaders, our outreach to promote participation is critical to the viability of future funding. The varied resources provided by the US Census Bureau, CA Census, and Mendocino Counts were great. There was so much to choose from and all the sources really helped to create local outreach.

The support from key people from the US Census Bureau, CA Census, and Mendocino Counts were also really important. The shared conversations, resources, and planning strengthened the work with breadth and depth. I especially appreciate Mignonne Pollard from the CA Census Project who was my main support for the project. She was readily available and extremely helpful.

The changing landscape of the structures and protocols were challenging when templates were altered, budgets re-written, and more meetings posted on the calendars. These frequent additions and changes added more work to the project at the county office level.

Of course, the COVID crisis put a halt to so much of the outreach but I was impressed at the innovation of all partners to re-define outreach. What mattered was the continued

information and encouragement for everyone to participate in the census. With the completing of contracts, it will still be important for everyone as individuals to encourage others to participate.

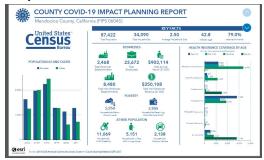
